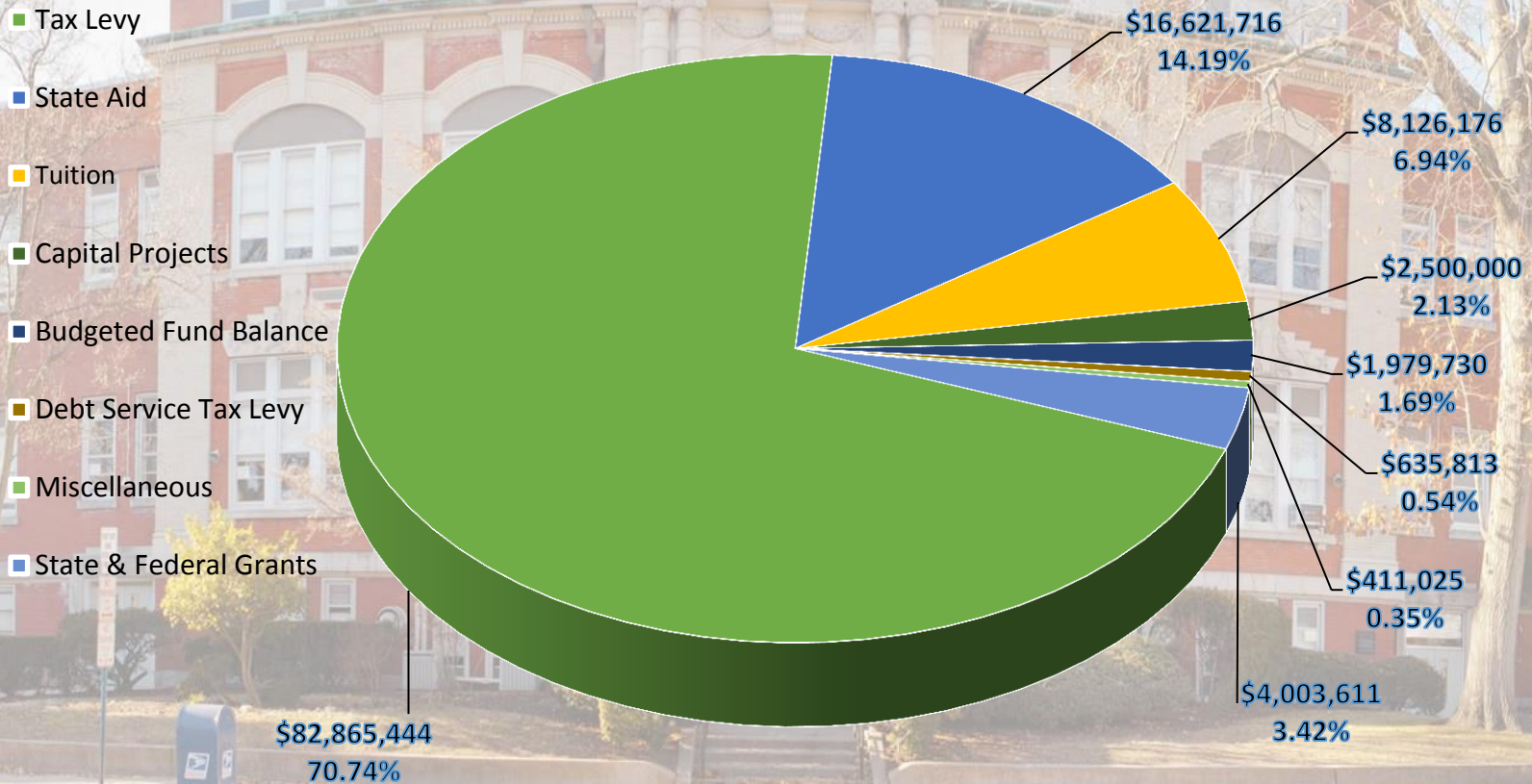

2018-2019 Budget

- November – January - Discussion and development of the 2018-2019 projections with the Budget and Finance Committee along with the Administrative Team.
- March 15– State Aid numbers are released by the State. The District received them later due to the election of the new Governor.
- March 19– Tentative budget is presented for approval.
- March 26 – Public hearing to present the budget for final approval.
- April 17 – Election for approval of the District budget.

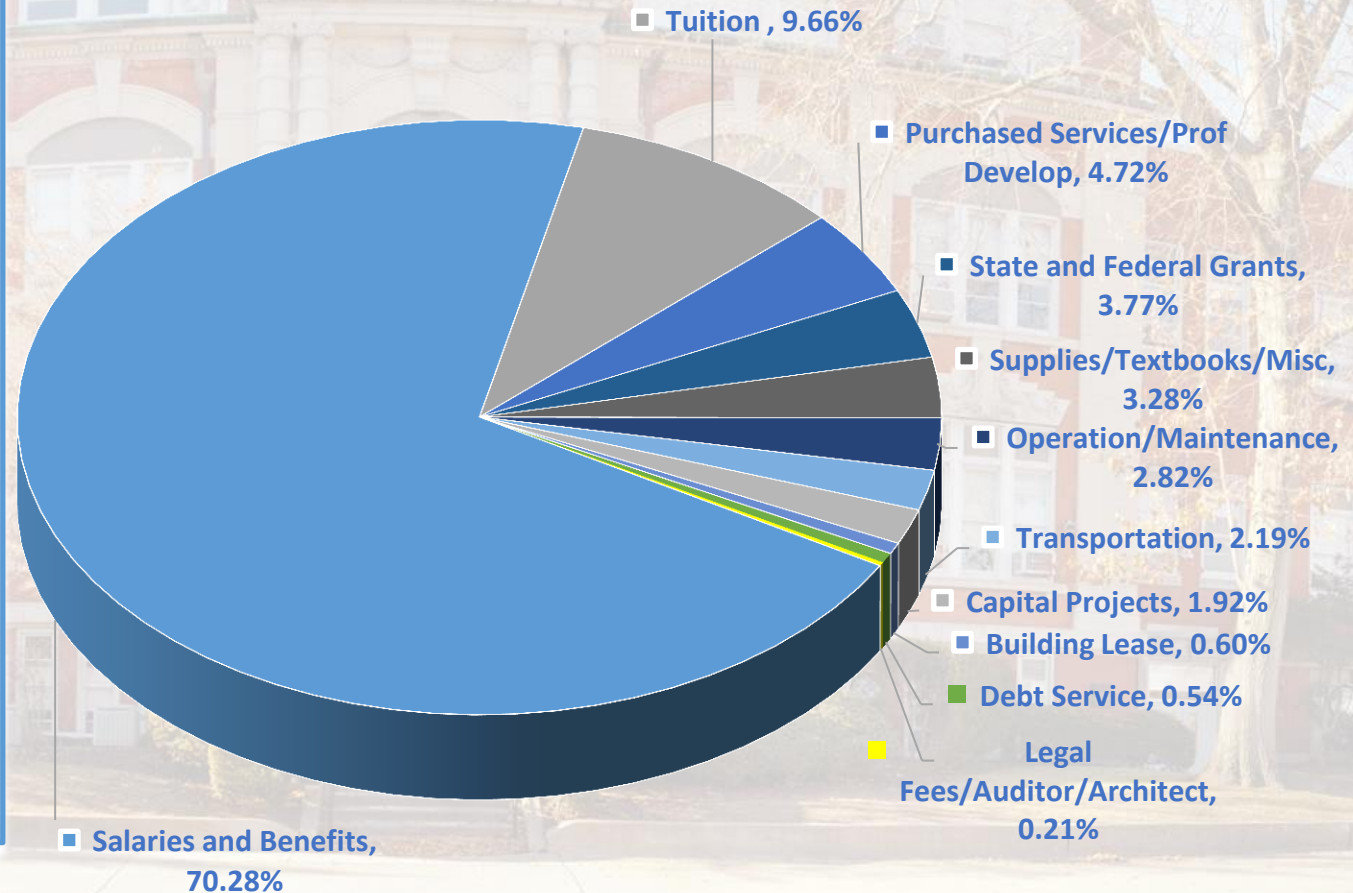

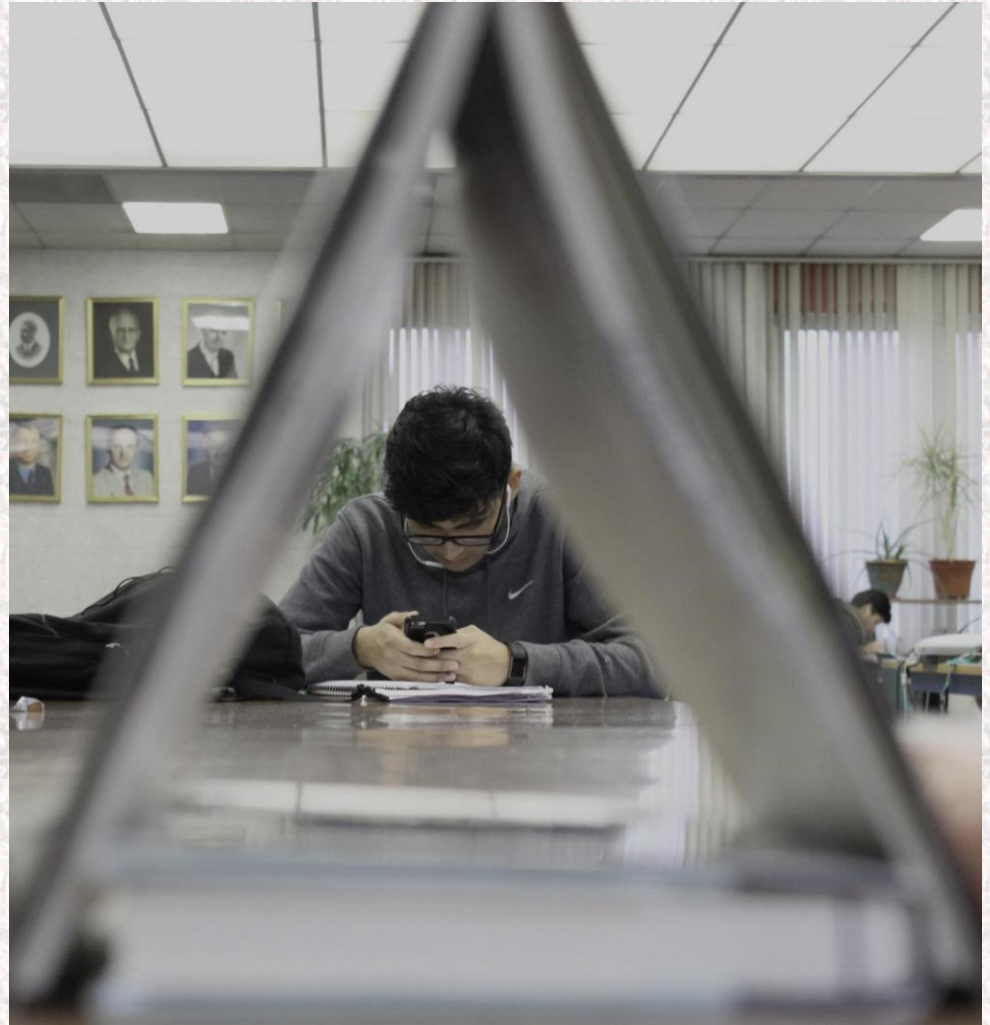

SPECIAL LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER - CLASS III

The Police Training Commission will begin processing waiver requests for Special Law Enforcement Officer Class III on July 1, 2017. In accordance with the enabling legislation, all applicants for the title must meet the following:

Pre-certification Requirements:

- ☐ Must be a retired police officer who has previously served as a duly qualified, fully-trained, full-time officer in any municipality or county of this state, or as a member of the New Jersey State Police, and must be living in New Jersey.

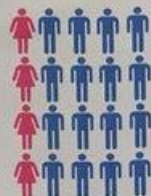

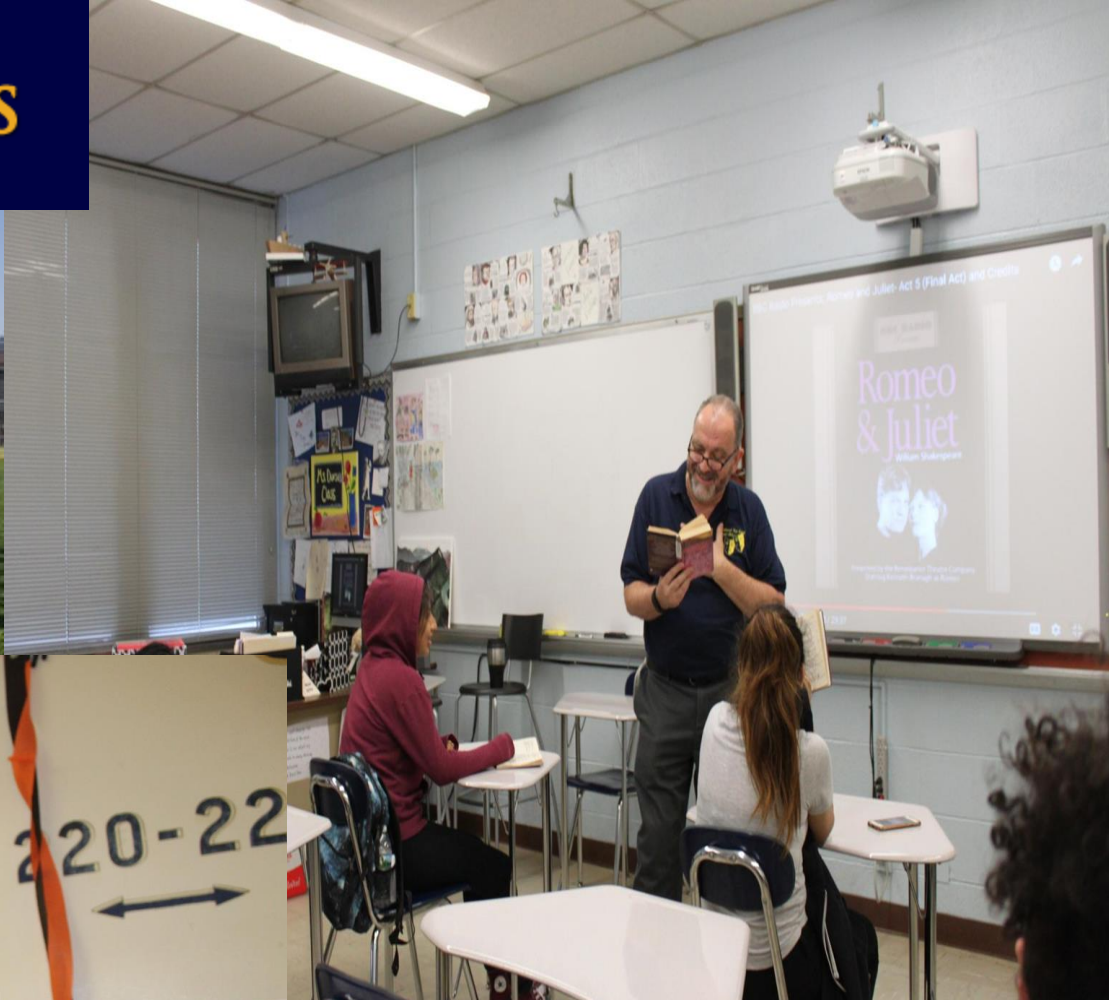
