

Achieving Our Goals Requires Collaboration





Curriculum & Assessment

- English Language Arts K-12 Alignment Initiative that will focus on professional learning to support Teachers and Administrators with providing high-quality and responsive reading instruction to meet the needs of our diverse learners.
- Our Physical Education & Health Department will have major curriculum updates to align with the New Jersey Student Learning Standards. Staff will receive support with implementing instruction that addresses diversity, identity, as well as project-based physical Education Activities and student-led work.



Professional Development

- District-Wide Book Study for all staff that focuses on *Rigorous, Responsive, Brain-Based Teaching*, which will include Intensive Professional Learning for all District Administrators
- Reimagining Schools Summer Institute (July 2022).
- Year-Three Professional Learning facilitated by the District Equity Team (DET: pictured) for all certificated staff.
- Train-the-Trainer professional learning will be provided throughout the 2022-2023 school year to support members of the DET.



Supporting Social-Emotional Learning (SEL)

- •At the elementary level, the School Counselor and/or Social Worker will support students with classroom lessons on the SEL Competencies, follow-up on attendance data and outreach to parents.
- •District and grant funds support a contract with *Care Plus* for clinicians at HMS and HHS; funds also provide for furniture and supplies to create "mindful" spaces in our schools.
- Participation in the DREAMS Project (Developing Resiliency with Engaging Approaches to Maximize Success), will continue and provide professional development in trauma-informed teaching and the Nurtured Heart Approach for staff across the district.




- Reset rugs and related activities in elementary classrooms across the district will support students with self-management and responsible decision- making;

Sustainable Jersey for Schools Update

- All Hackensack Public Schools are now Bronze-level certified, with four schools also submitting for and earning Digital Schools Star Recognition (Hackensack High School, Hackensack Middle School, Fairmount School and Jackson Avenue School).
- Work continues for 2022-2023 with several schools going for Silver certification.
- Funding dedicated to green initiatives (i.e., recycling programs, outdoor gardens, PBL units)



Technology

- Cybersecurity enhancements
- HHS eSports Program (in conjunction with The Boys and Girls Club)
- Improving communication between District/Schools and home
- Upgrading/replacing classroom technology, including obsolete SMARTBoards with newer interactive LED panels.
- Upgrading/Augmenting building security systems, including cameras and PA systems.







Elementary School Highlights

• Hillers Elementary School

• Working to enhance their students' experiences outside of the classroom by having outside assembly programs which relate to multicultural awareness and STEM, among other things.

• Fairmount Elementary School

- Using a portion of its budget to provide ongoing grade level appropriate field trip experiences to connect and extend student learning to the curriculum and the real world.
- Classroom and bulletin boards will be expanded schoolwide to highlight/celebrate student work.
- Adding a fully furnished Mindfulness Room with couches, bean bag chairs, and sensory pads to support students' social-emotional
 wellness.
- Expected to complete it's elevator project to become a handicap accessible building.

<u>Jackson Elementary School</u>

- Will have the following programs implemented during the 2022-2023 school year:
 - Mentoring Clubs Pretty Brown Girls and Boys Mentoring Club.
 - Reading Engagement Purchasing items for the reading program such as rugs and flexible seating.
 - A Culturally Relevant lending library for teachers and students, which will also be a "Shared Lending" library where parents can go to the school and borrow books to read with their children and where teachers can borrow books that are on grade level through the Fountas Pinnell program
 - Community Involvement PTA parents will be trained by our reading specialists to become "reading volunteers" during parent workshops. The "Reading Volunteers" will read to different students in different homerooms.
 - Provide IXL online instructional support for reading and math.
 - DREAMS The 3 Strands of the Nurtured Heart in Place
 - Beautification of Jackson planting trees, flowers and garden funded through an active Grant through TD Bank.



High School & Middle School Highlights

High School

- Named, once again, one of America's Best High Schools from US News World Report (2021, 2020, 2019, 2018, 2017).
- Expanding Summer School offerings in Culinary Arts, Biology, Advanced Placement Prep and other courses.
- Cafeteria is undergoing major renovations and will have an entirely new look.
- Main Entrance renovations is continuing.



Middle School

- o Installing a state of the art LED Street sign on State Street to provide the community with information about HMS along with news and upcoming events
- Upgrading the HMS Media Center to modernize the space with new furniture and a new configuration to make optimal use of the space for both small groups of 15 for Professional Development and to allow students continued use of the media center
- Will continue to expand their extracurricular offerings for students as the school builds on it's successful first year of Middle School Intramural Sports
- Cafeteria is undergoing renovations and will have a new look




Pre-School
