Professional Development

- Professional learning will continue to support assessment, data analysis, and and Tier 1 instructional response. With a strong foundation in place, the district will also invest in a comprehensive platform designed to enhance the analysis of Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) associated interventions and deepen our understanding of students' academic growth.
- In the upcoming school year, the district will offer differentiated professional learning to support high-quality, standards-based reading instruction for all students, with a focused effort on strengthening foundational reading skills in grades kindergarten through grade-eight.
- Another area of focus will be teacher-led professional development to meet the requirements of our District's *Comprehensive Equity Plan*.
- An emphasis on using data analysis to progress monitor student performance in math will be an additional professional learning focus for our elementary, middle, and high school teachers.



Curriculum

Strengthening K–8 Literacy Through Intentional Curriculum Use

The district will continue its implementation of HMH Into Reading (K–5) and HMH Into Literature (6–8) to support high-quality, research-based literacy instruction. These programs offer a cohesive, standards-aligned pathway that fosters meaningful engagement with complex texts and develops the essential reading, writing, and thinking skills students need to meet the expectations of the New Jersey Student Learning Standards for ELA.

Building Momentum and Alignment in Mathematics Instruction

The district will continue to advance high-quality math instruction through Year 3 of Reveal Math at the elementary level and Year 4 of Illustrative Math at the middle school. These problem-based programs provide a consistent, rigorous experience that builds critical thinking and deep understanding. As part of our commitment to vertical alignment, Illustrative Math will also enter its third year of implementation in Algebra I, strengthening the bridge between middle and high school and preparing students for future academic and career success.

Using Data to Support Every Learner

The district will continue to implement universal screening assessments in ELA and Math across grades K–12. These assessments provide timely, meaningful data that help educators identify student needs, personalize instruction, and monitor progress, allowing for more informed, responsive teaching at every level.

Preschool Expansion for 2025-2026

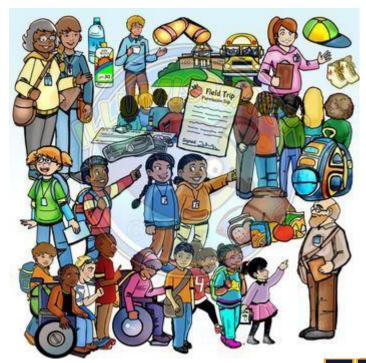
The following is PEA funded:

- Professional Development partnership with Apple Education and iPads to enhance curriculum units.
- Professional Development: Montclair State University (Pyramid Model: SEL) and Small Group Instruction.
- Our full day 3 year-old preschool program is projecting
 7 classrooms with 105 spots for students.
- Our full day 4 year-old preschool program is projecting
 15 classrooms with 185 spots for students.

- ★ One additional Social Worker (50% funded by the District and 50% by the School-Based Mental Health Services Grant (SBMHS) and reallocation of funds from vendor services to 2 full-time Social Workers to provide for dedicated therapists at each grade 5 - 12.

- ★ Continued implementation of mental health screening services in grades 7 12.
- ★ Implementation of the CASEL Atlas Data Protocol by the SEL Team to create an Action Plan and support data-informed decision making.



Technology

1. Device and Technology Refresh:

- Chromebooks at the Hackensack Middle School will be replaced with new models to enhance student learning as needed.
- New staff devices to support instructional needs.

2. Advancing Digital Learning:

- Al tools will be integrated into the classroom experience, complementing the use of existing educational technology.
- Continued investment will be made in instructional technology to ensure a smooth and effective digital learning environment.

3. Infrastructure and Security Improvements:

- The district will focus on improving its digital and physical infrastructure to provide a stable and reliable learning environment.
- Security enhancements will be made to safeguard both the digital and physical spaces, ensuring a safe environment for all users.



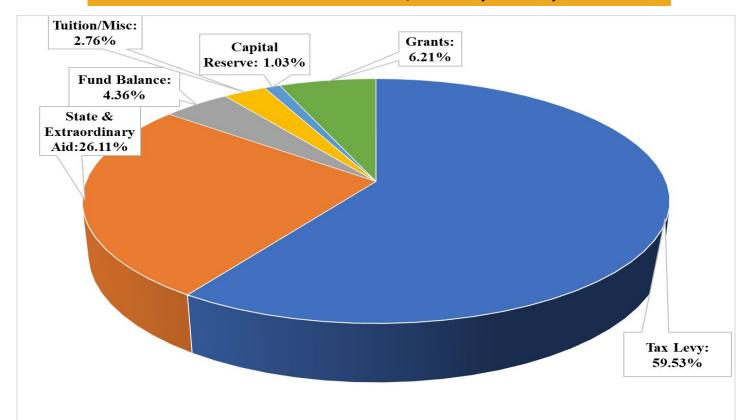

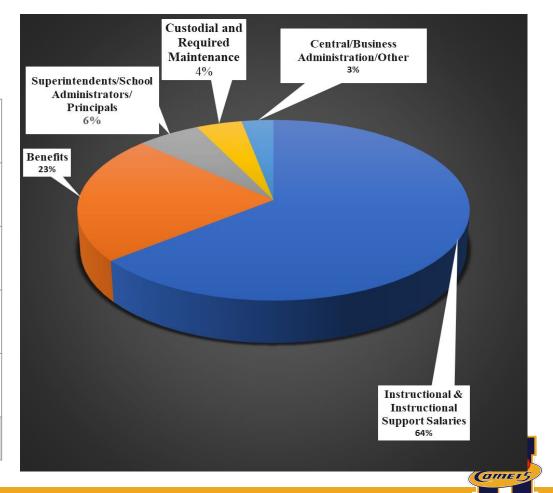

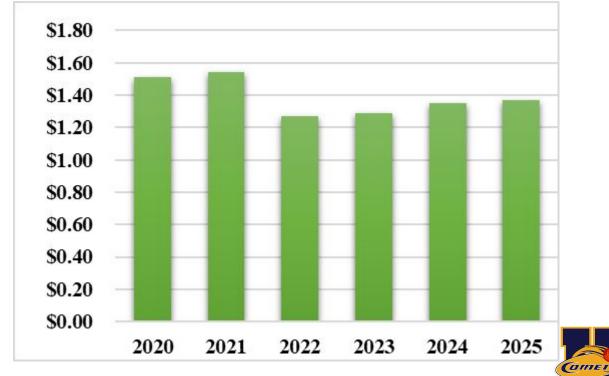
